OUR AIM

The Uehiro Project for the Asian Research Library (U-PARL) is a research institute established in April 2014 with a grant from the Uehiro Foundation on Ethics and Education.

Currently, the General Library at the University of Tokyo's Hongo Campus is undergoing a large-scale renovation and expansion. This multi-year project includes several subprojects, one of which is the development of a new Asian Research Library. In addition to collecting new materials, the Asian Research Library will bring together many of the thousands of volumes of Asia now scattered throughout the university to one location inside the General Library, in order to become a world-class facility for researching, teaching, and learning about Asia. U-PARL was set up to support the conceptualization, development, and eventual operation of the Asian Research Library through the input of a group of Asian studies specialists.

U-PARL brings together specialists from a variety of disciplines, with expertise on East Asia, Southeast Asia, South Asia, West Asia, and other regions. As members of U-PARL, they make use of their individual expertise to contribute to the acquisition, organization, and collection of materials for the new library, to help draw-up floor plans, and to otherwise help realize the new library through research collaboration and exchange with libraries throughout Japan and overseas.

Beyond the design of the space and organization of materials, this project requires us to consider what a library can offer in today's world, how libraries can strengthen their role in research and education, and how to develop better ways to archive and disseminate the library's vast materials and resources.

U-PARL aims to bring together many different intellectual endeavors in order to enable the new library to act as a hub for research, bringing researchers together with the most cutting-edge resources and knowledge about Asia.



CONNECTING ASIAN STUDIES WITH LIBRARY SCIENCE

Shaping the Library Collection and Layout

Although the library is now undergoing a great change in appearance, but its core is the materials it houses. U-PARL is growing the collection of the Asian Research Library through the three approaches of: purchasing new materials, accepting donated materials, and bringing together materials from the university's various libraries and reading rooms. While cooperating with many specialists from various fields, conversations are being held on the design and the operation plan for the open stacks of the Asian Research Library, which will open on the fourth floor of the General Library.

Realizing an "Intellectual Commons"


Today, a university library is not only a place for holding research materials, but also needs to function as a space where people can gather, interact, and create new knowledge. In order to create this "Intellectual Commons" both physically and virtually, U-PARL holds various seminars and workshops to learn about and exchange ideas on advanced Asian studies, and works to develop and expand access to digitized research materials.

Putting Classifications to Use

In the Asian Research Library, materials from an extremely broad range of geographic areas, time periods, and fields of research are collected together under the term "Asia." U-PARL has worked in cooperation with specialists in both library science and Asian research to come up with a classification system that allows for a wide overview of the entire spectrum of Asian knowledge and which reflects the three aspects of region, language, and subject area. From early on, in the spring of 2017, practical use has been made of this system in the temporary shelving space secured in the stacks of the General Library.



Working toward the opening of the new library, construction is progressing on the Asian Research Library open stacks on the fourth floor (pictured March 2018). Tens of thousands of resources on Asia, from East through to West, will be shelved by geographical region, with individual seating and study benches nestled among the stacks. Located in the center will be an atrium invoking the design of the original 1928 library and a new seminar room that can be used for small scale events. The seminar room will also function as an open space where researchers can freely engage in discussion.

Connecting Digital Materials with Asian Studies

Today, libraries are expected to take on the new role of archiving digital materials alongside those that are paper-based. At U-PARL, aiming at the realization of digital browsing of materials in the underground automated storage and retrieval system, photographing of the covers, title pages, and contents of materials is steadily being implemented. Also, while keeping a close eye on trends in open data, digital images of rare Chinese books purchased by U-PARL and calligraphic models from the General Library collection have been made public on the website "Flickr" under the terms and conditions of a Creative Commons license.





Connecting the University of Tokyo to Asian Studies throughout the World

Researchers at the University of Tokyo conduct a wide range of outstanding research on Asia in both the Humanities and the Natural Sciences. There has been progress in strengthening ties between researchers through initiatives such as the "Network for Education and Research on Asia (ASNET)." U-PARL is working to build on these initiatives, to carve out a new collaborative space based around the collecting and researching of materials, and to make the Asian Research Library a hub and gateway that widens the network of researchers on Asia both within and beyond the University of Tokyo.

Exploring the Functions of a Research Library

In world-class level research libraries, subject librarians equipped with specialist knowledge in each field of research are responsible for building the library collection and supporting leading-edge research activities. How can the Asian Research Library best support Asian studies at the University of Tokyo? In communication with research libraries inside and outside of Japan, U-PARL is exploring the types of roles specialist Asian research human resources can be expected to fulfil.




